House Bill 343, effective on 04/05/2007

This bill made significant changes to the law governing the operation of a motor vehicle by drivers under the age of 18.

- 1. Hours of Driving:
 - a. Drivers between 17 and 18 years of age may not drive between the hours of 1:00 A.M. and 5:00 A.M.
 - b. Drivers between 16 and 17, or those under 18 who have a learner's permit, may not drive between midnight and 6:00 A.M.
 - c. Exceptions exist when driving with a parent or when traveling to, or from, work. In order for the work privileges to apply, a written statement from your employer needs to be with you in the vehicle for verification.

PLEASE NOTE: A local curfew ordinance or court order may further restrain a juvenile's right to drive during certain hours.

- 2. Passengers Restrictions:
 - a. Drivers under the age of 17 may not have more than one unrelated person in the vehicle with them unless they are accompanied by a parent or legal guardian.
- 3. Penalties for moving violations:
 - a. If a juvenile is adjudicated or found guilty of a moving violation during the first six months after the issuance of their driver's license, then the Court must impose a license suspension for the duration of either six months or until the person reaches the age of 17, whichever is shorter. During the license suspension the juvenile shall only be permitted to drive with a parent or legal guardian.
- 4. Child Restraints:
 - a. Requires all children between the ages of 4 and 15 to be in an approved child restraint system or a seat belt when in a motor vehicle.
 - b. Removes the previous exemption for out of state residents in the child restraint law.
 - c. Establishes a fine of \$25.00 for a first violation of the child restraint law.
